
PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE by Terry Janssen





Topic: Phone Scams

I'm sure you've all heard of phone scams, and you have probably received some suspicious calls at some point yourself. We hear about all kinds of different scams here at the police department. These scammers can pretend to be anyone from your grandchild to the IRS to an NBPD employee. They can be convincing: sometimes using fake Caller IDs or information from social networking sites and hacking into email accounts to make it seem more real. They'll pressure you by playing on your emotions to get personal information or money from you. They create a sense of urgency and make you feel like you need to act before you can think through what is going on.

Here's what you can do:

Stop. Check it out. Do not give out any personal information until you have verified the identity of the caller. For calls from alleged government agencies or utility companies: Ask the caller for their name, department, and business phone number. Confirm that information by calling the organization at a phone number found on the internet or through official correspon-

dence/billing statements. If the caller refuses to provide this information, terminate the call immediately. In personal situations, try to contact the loved one who you are concerned about, or call friends or another family member before you send any money or give out personal information.

Keep your information safe. Never give out personal identifying information, such as your social security number,

bank account or credit card account numbers, to anyone you do not know.

Pass this information on to a friend. You may not have received one of these calls, but chances are that you know someone who will - if they have not already.

Everyone Loves a CART Parade!





Happy 2021 New Year to all of you who have struggled through the most frustratingly unusual year of our lives. It has been a devastatingly tragic year with so many lives cut short by the virus. Loved ones locked down to where they were not even able to just SEE their family members. And businesses and livelihoods have been destroyed beyond recovery EVER. Enough said, as we are all tired of the onslaught of writings about Covid 19.

Late last year the Board of Directors of the BIIA elected for the first time in recent memory, to send to members of the Association from 2020 and 2019, an invitation to join the Association for 2021 the beginning of this year. The invitation included the increase of Membership Level for the Basic from \$50 to \$65, and an increase in the Bronze Level from \$100 to \$125. Other levels remained the same. Noted, expenses have all escalated since the last increase ten years ago.

The Committee tasked with putting together the invitations addressed specifically to each prior membership, completed the task and mailed them just before Thanksgiving. The mailing included a letter to the membership individuals, a sheet with information of the increased membership levels and the donation level the member was the last time they joined. Lastly, a return envelope was included with an application.

The effort to encourage the prior members from both years to join early in 2021, has been a success. As of January 18, 2021, the membership total is 406, which is 182 more than the same time last year.

Hopefully, the onset of vaccinations for Covid 19 should loosen the restrictions in our lives and activities usually sponsored by the BIIA for our Island Community, will be allowed once again. The BIIA Board and its volunteers who head-up the activities are eager to get to work and put these on.

The thrust of the membership enrollments at the beginning of the year is very encouraging, we would like to thank all of you who have joined for placing your faith in the Association. We will once again do our best to achieve our goal, "Improvement." If you have not joined the Balboa Island Improvement Association yet, you are not too late. Every Island Bridge Newsletter has an application that we will accept throughout the year.

When things start happening, I encourage you to become involved as a volunteer. It is fun to work toward the goal of accomplishing the task, and then seeing the enjoyment of the community as a result of your participation in 2021. Let's hope for the best!
