It's a busy Spring for CERT!

First, CERT was asked to participate in the Maritime Disaster Drill sponsored by the Newport Beach Fire Department, which involved 19 federal, state, county and municipal agencies from all of Orange County. The exercise postulated a collision of two vessels off the Corona del Mar beach creating 84 "victims," with life guards, paramedics, ski-dos, Harbor Patrol, Coast Guard boats, and helicopters from three different agencies affecting "rescues." Eighty people were saved within 30 minutes! Twenty-one CERT members helped with registration, problem-solving, organizing & monitoring fire truck parking, food distribution, and acting as victims. Of these volunteers, EIGHT were Balboa Islanders! As always, Balboa Island CERT shines.

Additionally, the City-wide Preparedness Drill will be held on the morning of May 14th. Balboa Island CERT will participate for the third year.





As March arrived on Balboa Island, it came with its beautiful partner: Spring This month I tried my best to pick a home that looked as though it would be spectacular once spring arrived. At the beginning of the month...islanders had young plants in the ground, roses had new shoots but no blooms--so I held my breath and chose 201 Garnet as this month's Garden of the Month.

A couple of weeks went by until I received a call from owner Maxine Maly for me to come by and take pictures. And there it was: the spectacular spring garden that I thought might be coming.

Maxine moved to this home in 2015 but she is a long-time resident here, having owned several homes previously on the island. The first thing Maxine did once escrow closed was tear out all of the plantings and start fresh with her incredible design sensibility. I learned that her last home had been on the Sherman Gardens tour. Her knack for gardening has become a side business for her. All of her jobs are by word of mouth and can be eties. as a child who wanted a rose garden. So



into the dirt she went--first learning how to plant roses and then branching into blooms of every variety. Today she finds that three things dictate her gardening college, her other two sons, James and style: color, variety, and placement. I can tell that her garden is one that blooms all year long as she considers seasons in her placement. Maxine is known for rescuing plants from houses being demolished or remodeled on the island. She has an incredible knowledge of rare plant varieties and what will bloom in our climate zone. Just some of the things you will see in her garden: roses of every kind, mystic spires, Daffodils, Foxgloves, Shasta Daisies, California Poppies, Blue Hydrangea (fed by coffee grounds and rusty nails), Iris, Ranunculus, Azaleas, and variegated plants of different varistructure for Sweet Peas to climb. April Garden "La Petite Folie"

April's "Garden of the Month" began with the thought that spring must be in full bloom on the little island, just as it is in my neck of the woods. So, my "Garden of the Month" sign and I headed on over to the little island, only to be met with construction on the bridge, construction on the streets, remodels, and new builds around every corner. I was wondering how I was going to even find anything. And then I made a turn and there it was: a gorgeous spring garden on the corner of also known as "La Petite Folie".

During construction, the owners of this home and garden worked with a designer from Armstrong's Nursery and together they came up with the idea for a French garden that honors loved ones who have passed. Since its initial design, there is a trifecta constantly working that

designer named Patty, and 3) Sabino, a gardener. Eighteen Double Delight roses are planted to honor a mom and sister who passed away within a short amount of time. Later, a friend made a donation for the owners to purchase a rose in honor of a father's passing, as well. After long consideration, the owners picked a gorgeous red rose which is planted amid the Double Delights. Curious as to the name of this rose that fit so well, the owner flipped over the tag on the rose bush that had so lovingly been chosen. Guess what it was. Drop Dead Red. I am not kidding.

If you walk by to see "La Petite Balboa Avenue and Abalone. A home Folie", take a second to notice the depth of the home: it is only 19 feet. But it is an amazing 19 feet surrounded by Cecil Bruner climbing roses, Lobelia, Alyssum, Geraniums, Boxwood Hedges, topiaries, and Azaleas. All are planted to give the illusion of a French secret garden and/or a British window box. Was that achieved? Absolutely. Congratulations "La Petite consists of 1) ideas from the owners, 2) a Folie". You are amazingly grand for being so small.
